Jake Owensby, in his book, "The Resurrection Shaped Life," says Jesus wasn't just raised from the dead. That, he says, is resuscitation, not resurrection. Owensby writes, "Jesus passed through death, once and for all, to a radically new kind of life."

#### The SoCal Garden Connection

Last month I talked a lot about Southern California and our wonderful Mediterranean climate. This month I would like to talk about how this actually affects our gardens – and some draw backs that we may face. Also, there are some requirements that we need to be aware of.

When Gordon and I told Father Rob that we would like to start a community garden on "the back forty," he said something like, "That's a great idea but it has been tried several times before and failed." So, our first task was to find out why they failed the gardens failed and devise a way not to fail.

The soil in our garden is clay, hard as a rock when dry and slippery when wet – very difficult to work with. Other areas in SoCal have sandy soil.

However, it is good soil, if you don't let it dry out or get it too wet. (The goodness was confirmed by every professional that looked at our soil. The people from Wilson Creek Winery were impressed with how good it is.) The problem is that it is hard to work. We decided that we would have to make our soil easier to work with.

The plot of land we were planning to use was a patch of weeds. We would have to control the weeds. No one wants to pull weeds. (Well almost no one – I actually like it, I find I very meditative. It may also have something to do with the fact that my kids would leave me alone when I started to pull weeds.)

Let's face it, we live on the edge of a desert. We do not get enough rain to sustain our gardens without help. We would need an easy way to water. We are very busy people. We don't have time to water our garden every day, nor do we want to be out in 90° temperatures to water.

Last of all and maybe most important – we needed to be successful.

These were the problems. (We would discover a couple more along the way. I will discuss these next month along with some other discoveries.) We knew that if we were not going to fail, we needed to address and solve these problems.

After research and experimentation in our home garden we came up with 4 solutions that would make our gardeners successful:

- 1. **Use raised beds**. This would get our garden beds up and out of the clay soil so we would not have to dig into the clay.
- 2. Water with drip irrigation in each bed and with each on a timer. This would solve the water problem.
- 3. **Control the weeds**. We knew we could control weeds with some effort: wood chips and a good layer of compost.
- 4. Use a method of gardening called "**no dig**."

Using these guidelines, we experimented in our front yard for a year. We were blown away by the results. This garden was better than any we had hoped for or had ever had before.

In October of 2010 we installed our first garden beds for the Emmanuel Community Demonstration Garden. Then the beds were planted for the 2011 growing season.

We had some very happy gardeners. And, we were successful!
