Easter will always come. Hopefully we won't have to live through a pandemic next time to experience all of its blessings.

#### Senior Warden's Corner

It falls within the Senior Warden's duties to talk about stewardship from time to time. Before you tune out and move onto the next article, this is not about money. Nor is it about instilling guilt about what you may or may not be doing. It is about the Emmanuel philosophy regarding spiritual service. I have been a part of churches where the plan was to get newcomers involved in some aspect of the church as soon as possible. The job that the parishioner was encouraged to take was usually based on the current greatest need, not a mutual discernment between pastor and congregant. When I first moved back to Southern California from Utah, I became one of the lay pastors of a church in Anaheim. Someone decided I should take over the teenage group. There are many people that are gifted in working with children and adolescents. I am not one of them. I muddled through several months dreading every meeting.

Emmanuel operates under a different philosophy. If you have a burden for an existing area of ministry, let the rector know. In most cases there is always room for one more. If you have an idea for a new area of ministry, discuss that with the rector as well. Perhaps God is calling you to head up something new or to be a part of a vision that others share but have not verbalized yet. You could be a catalyst that brings that out. Also, we all have experienced joy in a ministry for a season and then have been led by the Spirit in a different direction. If you are in a ministry that has become a chore rather than a blessing, talk with the rector about moving on guilt free. No one should continue in a ministry because they feel or are told that there is no one else to do it. Sometimes there is someone waiting to step into your place. Sometimes it is time for the ministry itself to cease, at least for a season. Daughters of the King is an example of this. It was very active, then became dormant and is now active again. Emmanuel has accomplished some amazing things for the size of the congregation, and I believe that it is largely because our service to God and the Church is Spirit-driven, not guilt-driven. I encourage you to continue to listen to the nudging of the Holy Spirit and find joy in your spiritual service.

### An Important Message from Your Treasurer

Operating income for February was \$18,346, while expenses were

\$22,641. This means we had a net operating fund loss of \$4,295 for the month. We had a few expenses that were not budgeted -- \$870 for repairing the sprinkler controller wiring and \$950 for tree trimming. We also paid \$489 for Worker's Comp insurance for 2021. (This was much less than the original \$4,000+ bill we received. We got them to recompute the bill because our payroll will be much less for most of the year due to the preschool being closed.) We also paid about \$260 more than normal to the Diocese for our Mission Share Contribution because they had underbilled us in January. In addition, we paid our bi-monthly water bill which was \$1,411. The bills don't

## Social Enterprise Project Update Discovery Gardens: Emmanuel Environmental Early Learning Center

The exterior of both the Good Shepherd Building and Havermale Hall have now been painted. New dual-pane windows have been installed in the Good Shepherd Building to save on the cost of heating and air conditioning. The excellent quality wood preschool furniture we used in Edwards Hall has been cleaned and, in some cases, refinished and repaired. We have everything we need except for about 10 wooden children's chairs. A new fence will be installed around the playground.

We are recruiting our new Director, and she/he should be selected by the end of April. We will start recruiting students soon, and the students and parents, along with the Emmanuel community, will participate in the decision making on the design of both the Children's Garden and the playground.

### The Growing Connection News from the Vineyard

For once we have good news. Yes, a long time in coming, but it is here now. I think I have said in a previous Epistle that we have joined the Small Wine Growers Association of Temecula led by a man called Greg Pennyroyal. He is the Vineyard manager of Wilson Creek Winery.

In earlier meetings with him, he had expressed a desire to help us, and had told us that the next time he was in the area he would visit our vineyard. On Thursday, Feb 26, Greg's executive assistant called us to say he was in Rancho Cucamonga, and if he finished his work early, he might be able to visit us. At lunch time she rang back to say he would meet us at the Vineyard at 3.00pm. Just after 3.00pm he arrived, along with his chief pruner, Pedro (and Pedro's wife). Greg's first comment was, "Wow, this was not what I expected. This is the best amateur vineyard I have ever seen." What a thrill for all our wine growers, particularly Lorra and me.

Yes, some things needed to be corrected. The two top wires are too thick, and we should throw away the rebar vine stakes (they deposit too much iron into the soil.) He recommended they be replaced with bamboo. We should also move the drip lines off the ground, as laying them there can cause bacteria to run up the water pipe. When there is no water running through the line, it is a perfect breeding place for bacteria, which can go straight into the root system.

When asked about the ground cover, he said leave all the California Poppies and spread more seeds (this we had done just before the rain came on Thursday Mar 4th.) He added that the lupins were the best ground cover possible because they are a legume. Legumes are part of the "pea" family, adding nitrogen to the soil rather than taking it out. On top of that they seed freely and come up everywhere. We are not sure where our first lupins came from, but they have certainly spread freely. The California Poppies, on the other hand, were planted by Ginger Cash in the Children's Garden very early in our Garden's life.

Greg then pulled up a handful of lush green weeds. Smelling them, he said our soil was in perfect condition, commenting, "Just look at the color and the size of them." He also recommended we do a soil test, just to make sure all the necessary nutrients are present. He spotted the weed cloth, saying it was an excellent idea for the driveway, but needed to be cut back approximately 18 inches from center of the main vine stalks, then covered with wood chips as we have been doing. He said that the chips form a perfect microculture for the vines to grow in. Greg is to source out for us the perfect replacement vine, most probably a Syrah or petite Syrah which are the best Pierce's Disease resistant vines available currently. His final comment was that we should have used only a single cordon rather than two when we originally planted the vines at 4 feet on center. He recommended we switch to planting at 6 foot centers, because this would allow a cordon on either side of the main stem. This will reduce the number of our vines from 119 to about 80.

All in all, it was a perfect 45 minutes. Both Lorra and I felt encouraged and blessed by his visit. We will be seeking donations for some of the expenses, perhaps doing something similar what we did last time when we asked for a donation for each vine, placing the donor's name or dedication on the vine.

Once we know what the various costs are, we'll be in further contact with you all.
