The Growing Connection

Greetings! Happy New Year! I know that was some time ago, but since I wrote the January Epistle article in December, I feel like this is the first one for 2022. So, Happy New Year and may this year be filled with blessings and beautiful gardens.

We had some very nice rain early in January. It has made everything want to grow. Even the weeds. If you have had a weed problem in the past or if you managed to let some things go to seed last growing season, you will soon see everything sprouting. If you don't want them growing where they are, they are weeds. Once they have sprouted the best thing to do is pull them before they set their roots down. Another option is to put down a weed preemergent. This will kill the seeds as they sprout. Be careful though, it will kill all seeds, it does not discriminate. If you put it down, do not plant seeds for about 3 months. However, it is fine to plant plants that are already growing.

A good number of years ago I managed to let a couple celery plants go to seed. The next year I had an abundance of celery children. I pulled most of them out, leaving only what I thought I could use. Every year since I let one plant go to seed, and I have had a continuous supply of celery. This year we let fennel go to seed and I am expecting hundreds of baby fennels any time soon.

The prayers are working. Last Saturday I spent most of the day preparing for the Plant Sale on January 15. This is a real improvement – working most of the day. Today I managed to plant a good number of seeds, mostly herbs. I think I have shared with you that I am trying my hand at growing from seed – a new adventure for me. I have always been too late to grow from seed, or maybe too impatient. Yesterday, Gordon came home telling me about the wonderful selection of plants at Lowe's and I almost caved. Thus, the reason for the seed planting today. He said that the Lowe's plants were around \$5 each. Another good reason to grow from seed. I don't think any of my seed packets cost that much.

Gordon has planted our onions at the Community Garden – the one bunch we purchased actually had 96 plants. The shallots are planted, (His shallot 'seeds' were the baby ones he harvested from last years crop.) and Saturday he planted the leeks. In early January he planted Sugar Snap Peas and they are up. (He says, that despite our cold nights the soil is warm.) Now we are trying to figure out how to keep those cute little bunnies from eating the baby peas.

If you have a garden plot at the Garden, now is the time to be sure it's cleaned and ready for Spring planting. If you need help with this let us know. If you don't have a plot and would like one, or know someone who would like a plot, there is one waiting for you.

Poinsettia Care Following Christmas

Did you receive a Poinsettia for Christmas? Or maybe you just treated yourself to one? Are you now wondering what to do? (Besides tossing it.) Here in California, it is not that difficult to grow poinsettias in containers. After all, over 70% of the plants grown commercially start in California. Follow these simple steps to get your Poinsettia to rebloom for next Christmas.

- 1. Keep your plant free from drafts in a bright location for 6+ hours per day. Day temperatures need to be 65 to 70 degrees F, slightly cooler at night, but above 60° to avoid leaf drop.
- 2. Continue normal watering keeping the plant evenly moist until the 1st of April. (If your plant becomes leggy cut the stems back to about 4 inches and repot into fresh potting soil. Note: You can remove any faded or dried parts at any time.)
- 3. Check the plant regularly to make sure it has adequate moisture. Water only when the surface of the soil is dry to the touch.
- 4. After new growth begins, feed every couple of weeks with an all-purpose fertilizer.
- 5. In early summer, allow the plant to receive bright light until it is receiving full sun. At this time it's a good idea to repot the plant. Many container plants are grown in mostly compost. Because compost is lighter than a good potting soil it is the least expensive way for growers to ship. If when you tip your plant out of its pot you see a lot

- of roots move to a larger (one inch larger) pot and into a good potting soil. Continue to water and fertilize through the summer.
- 6. Around the middle of July remove 1 inch of terminal growth from each stem. Then again, in September trim off 2 to 3 inches to promote side branching. If you can allow 3 to 4 leaves to remain on each shoot.
- 7. Now for the fun part: getting your plant to bloom for next Christmas. Poinsettias require short day lengths to bloom. Begin keeping your poinsettia in complete darkness for about 12-14 hours per day from early October to Thanksgiving for an 8-10-week period. To achieve this place your plant in a closet, taking it out after 14 hours, or cover it with a large box every evening taking it off 14 hours later. Darkness means complete darkness with no house or street lights.
- 8. By Thanksgiving you can put the plant in a sunny area. Reduce water and fertilizer. By Christmas your poinsettia will again be the centerpiece of your Christmas décor.
- 9. If your plant does not bloom for Christmas, it will bloom after Christmas. And remember the foliage is very pretty, it makes a beautiful plant. And there is always next year.

Ask me about what I did some years ago when my poinsettia did not bloom for Christmas.
